Elisa: God does grow us through the really difficult times in life, but I had to look square in the eye...I had a wrong assumption, and the wrong assumption was that when I come to a decision point, I need to make sure that I don't choose what would ever make me happy, because that's what God wants from me. Where does that come from? That's not from the Word. That's not from Scripture. That's wackiness!

Eryn: No, where does that come from?

Elisa: Yeah, it comes from a wrong view of God, I think.

Elisa: Welcome to *God Hears Her*. I'm Elisa Morgan.

Eryn: And I'm Eryn Eddy. It's estimated that an average adult makes about 35,000 decisions each day, but what happens when one of those decisions is as life-changing as where to go to college or if you should say "yes" to his proposal or whether moving across the country for a job is the right thing to do for your life. Or what are some of the decisions you're facing right now?

Elisa: In today's conversation, Eryn and I are going to chat about ways in which we've learned to discern what God wants for our lives and what it means for us to hear God's voice and follow where He leads.

Eryn: So let's get to it. Here's our conversation about the crossroads of life on *God Hears Her*.

Elisa: So I can remember, I was in my early 20s, I'd finished college, I had expected, just because of a long relationship that I was headed towards marriage in this particular relationship, and it went a different way. We broke up and suddenly I'm going, "What am I going to do with the rest of my life?" And I spent a lot of time praying and journaling and reading the Bible and talking to people and trying to get wisdom. You know, what am I supposed to do? And...and I sensed out of a long process that I should do something that really made my heart glad and really made God's heart glad, and I decided to go into



ministry. So that meant I had to have more education, right? So I began to research where can I get training to go into ministry. I didn't really know what I was going to do. I thought I might be a chaplain...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...or counselor. No idea I'd do radio and be speaker and be a leader. No idea, but finally it came to this place where I had a choice between two schools.

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: And I was amazed I actually got accepted to both of them. That was huge! But I couldn't decide where to go. One was in the north in a very bustling city that was cold and scary to me, and the other one was in the mountains, and it was just like wooing me, you know, like a siren, "Come to me," [Laughing] and I ended up talking with this friend of mine who was older and wiser and I said, "Where do you think I should go?" And he goes, "Well, where do you want to go?" [Laughing]

Eryn: That was pretty easy.

Elisa: I said, "No way! I know I can't go where I want to go. If I'm going to be trained for ministry, don't I have to suffer?" [Laughing] You know what I mean? And he just kind of laughed and he said, "Maybe you should just go where you want to go. Might that be a...a good choice?" And my (makes noise) my head went shiggabang, blew up thinking, "You mean, in making a decision, maybe I can consider actually what I want?"

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: "How could that be godly?"

Eryn: Hmm. How many times have we been at that? That crossroads?

Elisa: Mm hmm. Yeah. Between what we want and we think what God wants and we think...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...they have to be polar opposites, you know, and so we have to choose between one or the other, and is that necessarily true? What do you think? Have you been in a situation where you have to make a...a choice, you have to make a decision, and boom, it's like up on the radar comes God's choice...



Eryn: Yes.

Elisa: ...and my choice, and they can't possibly be the same.

Eryn: Oh, yes! I feel like at some point in our life, we have thought that God's desire for us can't possibly be the same as our desire.

Elisa: Mm hmm.

Eryn: And I remember, it was when I was moving and I had no idea where I was going to live. I knew where I wanted to live, but I knew what I could afford, you know, and ah I remember praying this prayer like, "Lord, if it is your will, oh Lord, just place me here. Would you place me here?" And He did. He placed me there.

Elisa: Hmm.

Eryn: But...

Elisa: You made the finances work and...

Eryn: It was all lined up. I mean, it was wild, and in that moment, I was just like "Oh my, gosh! You desire what I desire? Really? Like we're on the same page?" [Laughing] Um, so wait, what did you end up choosing? Like I want to go back to that. Like what...

Elisa: Yeah, I ended up choosing what I wanted. I ended up choosing the mountain location, and I've actually been here in Denver for almost 45 years now, and...

Eryn: Wow!

Elisa: ...it's been...it's been an amazing decision. I actually think I probably would have received great training at either institution. I think I probably would have made a wonderful life...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...in either institution. It really boiled down to was my heart aligned with God's...

Eryn: Mmm.



Elisa: ...and was I listening...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...to Him? Was I seeking Him? And as I did, I did the best I could and so...you know, to kind of principalize this for a...for a second, I think there are times when we come to a crossroads, when we need to make a decision, and we always need to look at what we're thinking, what kind of wonky stuff is going on in our brains?

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: And...and when my brain was this assumption that God couldn't possibly want me to be happy.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: He would want me to be suffering if I was going to be trained for the ministry, because that's the way you become more effective for the ministry. Well, guess what? I still have been able to suffer.
[Laughing]

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: Just because I went to the mountains didn't mean there wasn't some training, some preparation...

Eryn: Right.

Elisa: ...and still is. God does grow us through the really difficult times in life. But I had to look square in the eye of...I had a wrong assumption, and the wrong assumption was when I come to a decision point, I need to make sure that I don't choose that would ever make me happy, because that's what God wants from me. Where does that come from? That's not from the Word. That's not from Scripture. That's wackiness!

Eryn: No, where does that come from?

Elisa: Yeah, it comes from a wrong view of God, I think.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: And I was young and I still didn't know a whole lot.



Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: I still don't know a whole lot, but, you know, I was especially young and especially, if you will, ignorant of God's ways. And so I...I think one principle here is to look at what kind of assumptions are behind the way we're thinking about God and sometimes we need to study the Bible, sometimes we need to like I did and meet with somebody who's a little further down the road...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...and run our thinking by them, and they go, "Hello, Sweet Pea, you're kind of wackadoodle here."

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: You know, "Let's...let's relook at that."

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: Sometimes it means we need to pray and ask the Lord to truly direct us like you did with your living situation. And where...what might work out, just telling God, "This is really what...what I want," and letting Him direct you to whether or not you can have that. What other kinds of...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...principles, I guess, come into mind? And I...I think there's other kinds of decisions too we come to besides just what we want versus what God wants.

Eryn: For sure. I think that a lot of the time I have chosen a path without God invited into it because I didn't think that He would be in it for what I desired.

Elisa: Oh, so you were like choosing against Him?

Eryn: Yeah, I was like, "Okay, well I'm going to choose this is what I want." And I even like...like just projecting that assumption on Him.

Elisa: I mean, sometimes we really are choosing between our way and God's way and there's a conscientious choice, okay, so earlier in my life, I remember when I was like in middle school, I started



noticing kids, you know, the popular kids. You know, they'd be out like drinking, smoking, doing the whatever stuff. Skipping school. And they were super popular!

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: And honestly I came to this point in...in my growing up where it was like, "Elisa, what do you want?"

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: "Which road are you going to choose? Are you going to choose this mmm on your own kind of rebellious path, or are you going to choose this, I would say, path to health?" And I intentionally chose the path of what I saw as health...

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: ...and now as I look back on it, I think I was truly choosing for God...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...rather than against God.

Eryn: You said something that just sparked a thought when you said, "for God instead of against God," and I think we...when we are at that crossroads, we can choose for God with God.

Elisa: Hmm.

Eryn: I think that He wants...it's a we, you know, for...for me...

Elisa: Ahh.

Eryn: ...it's a...it's a we experience...

Elisa: Mm hmm.

Eryn: ...at that crossroads. It's not "Am I going to make this and He's going to be pleased?" It's like He's in this with me...



Elisa: I love that.

Eryn: ...I think at the crossroads, we really do get to see is it our carnal; is it our spiritual?

Elisa: Mmm.

Eryn: I think about the difference between vulnerability and transparency even. Like transparency is to be seen through, seen at. Like I let God see,...

Elisa: Mmm.

Eryn: ...but I've been not very vulnerable, because vulnerable is to be open, to feedback, and so I want a vulnerable relationship with the Lord where it is a *we* at the crossroads. Um not a "Hey God, I know that you see this, but I'm going to make this choice against you where I don't even know." I love what you said for God versus against God. We have that choice.

Elisa: And, Eryn, this *we* you're talking about, you know, that's...that's really the...the deal here. You know, it's not me or God, it...it's us together. I remember a million years ago, I...I read this illustration that Henry Blackaby, he's the dude...he wrote *Experiencing God* way back when, talked about the difference between doing life on your own versus doing it in relationship with God, and...and he talked about what's really the role of the Holy Spirit in our lives. For instance, he described himself being given directions to go to this farm by a farmer, and so the farmer wrote out, you know, "Go 2.8 miles and then turn at the split at the fence and then you'll see a green barn and then you'll go 1.8 mile and then you'll go around a curve and cross a bridge..." You know, just so complicated and Henry's writing it all down just panicked, you know, trying to make sure he gets every little detail. And he's driving down, you know, with his sweaty palms on the steering wheel, and he's going, "Have I gone," you know, "the right amount of miles and is this the green barn and oh..." And he finally arrives and he's kind of a wreck. Well, he compared that time with going to the farm to another time...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...when the farmer himself was in the passenger seat, and said, "Turn here. Turn there. Go a little further. You're almost there."

Eryn: Mmm.



Elisa: “Okay, we’ve arrived.” And he arrived in peace, knowing that he had made exactly the right choices to get where he needed to go, and that to me, Eryn, just illustrates what you’re talking about with this we approach. When we come to crossroads, when we’re in a we with God, His Spirit directs us.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: His being woos us on to the right choice with Him.

Eryn: I love that. How do you know the choices that you’re making are a we choice?

Elisa: You know. there...there are some Scriptures that help us...

Eryn: Okay.

Elisa: ...understand like um Proverbs 16:9.

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: It says, “In their hearts human plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps.” And...and that verse is...because it’s a proverb, you know, it gives us kind of principle...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...that verse takes some thought...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...as we apply it in life, but, you know, if we really have chosen to be in a relationship with God, basically, we can make our best plans, but as we yield them to God...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...doesn’t He sometimes redirect or eventually provide His outcome...

Eryn: Hmm.



Elisa: ...with our best desires? I don't think we need to live in fear that we're going to screw it up. You know, if we're in relationship with Him, I think there's a...an element of doing our best to make the best decision...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...and trusting Him...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...because we're in a we relationship.

Eryn: Yeah. So I...I think about this next year as we are making decisions and we're just like times right now are so uncertain, you know. We don't know what choices maybe to make, but bringing them to Him and yielding them to Him is what I'm...I'm hearing you say.

Elisa: Yeah.

Eryn: We can hope for something, but putting our hope in Him.

Elisa: That's good. That's good. So maybe we're making decisions about continuing to do online school with our kids or a hybrid model or homeschool them or...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...put them back in school. You know, that...is there a right or wrong decision there? Huh, sometimes no, you know...

Eryn: Hmm

Elisa: ...it's the best decision you can make...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...with the information that we have.

Eryn: That's good.



Elisa: Or...or do I stay with this particular job? Is this an uncertain time to...to leave, but it's not meeting my needs or it's not meeting our family's need or I can feel on the horizon it...it might evaporate. I need to make a change. What do I do in this situation? Yeah, I think...I think you're on to this that we do our best and we yield the result, you know...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...we look at Scriptural parameters and we live within them and we yield the results for what might happen.

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: I can remember both my called to serve at MOPS and my call to leave my position at MOPS were crossroads moments. I...I was young when...when I first was asked to apply to become the president of that organization. They hadn't had one yet, and I felt like the biggest "no," [Laughing] in my heart because A. I'd never been pregnant. My...I have children through adoption. B. I come from a broken family.

Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: And C. I...I wasn't even sure I like women. [Laughing] It's just like me, God? You can to use me here?

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: And...and He did use His Word...

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: ...as...as I was reading in Scripture where I already had been reading...

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: ...I came to a verse in John where Jesus is talking in the upper room to His disciples in John 15:16, and He says to the disciples, "I've chosen you to bear fruit..."

Eryn: Mmm.



Elisa: ...Fruit that will last,” and He goes on to talk about how He will use His disciples to...to bring others to relationship with Jesus, and I began to see, “Oh, my gosh, Lord.”

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: That’s what the ministry of Mothers of Preschoolers is about. And...and I sensed Him nudging me there, so. And then 20 years later, I truly sense God wooing me to step out, because my presence there was impeding new generations of women leading.

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: You know, who needed to step into the...the true leadership of the...the ministry. And I didn’t know what He was leading me to do.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: I didn’t have a next lined up, and yet as I looked at the principles of what He had been doing in my life and teaching me through leading, there was a true call to relinquish the mantle of leadership...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...to...to train the younger generation, as...as Paul did to Timothy, and so I...I stepped into that and it actually took a year or two, maybe three years for me to go, “Oh, you’re actually...you’re actually placing me now in a different ministry in Our Daily Bread Ministries with *Discover the Word*, with *God Hears Her*, with writing, with total...but I didn’t know...

Eryn: Hmm.

Elisa: ...in that moment. It...it took putting my feet on a different path that was of God, that He had revealed, here’s the path, but I didn’t know where it was going to go.

Eryn: Mm hmm. Yeah. What...what did your...what did your prayers look like in...what do your prayers look like in yielding?

Elisa: Hmm. Pretty much, “I think this is what you’re saying, God. Would you either close the door or open it?”

Eryn: Hmm.



Elisa: “Would you convince me?” I remember in ...in a board meeting when I had already in my heart sensed that it was time for me to leave. I remember the board making a decision. We had...we had molded a mission statement for MOPS in a certain direction and 2008 hit, which was recession and was crazy terrifying for especially nonprofits, but for all of our country and the world, and the board made a decision to change the mission statement in a tweak that actually in that second changed my fit...

Eryn: Wow.

Elisa: ...and the need for a different kind of leadership. And I don't think they understood it in the moment. I didn't totally understand in that moment, but I knew the shift happened, and I actually in that moment closed my board book and put it aside, and it was my own heart going, “That's you, God. That's the transition that you're asking me to make.” And it wasn't actualized for maybe 6 months after that, but it was...it was moment, so I think when we ask God, when we journal about it, and we stay before Him, and we say, “This is what I want, God. What do you want? Um where does the we in our relationship leading? God, I can make the plans and trust you to direct my steps. All of these things, I really need to yield when it comes to that moment and you make it clear.”

Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: “I need to be willing to pick my path according to what you're saying.”

Eryn: That's so good.

Eryn: Welcome back to *God Hears Her*. I'm Eryn Eddy.

Elisa: And I'm Elisa Morgan, and in just a minute we're going to consider some additional ways in which we can make wise decisions when greeted by life's crossroads, but first just a quick reminder that the show notes are available in the podcast description. Eryn: Now back to our conversation on the crossroads of life. Let's begin by considering ways we can seek wisdom as we hope to make God-honoring decisions. This is *God Hears Her*.

Elisa: And, you know, the...the other element that really helps us at a crossroads is people...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...and, you know, I mentioned that I sent to a friend who was older and wiser when I was trying to make a decision about graduate school, but I also went to a friend when I was talking about this opportunity at MOPS and I asked a much older, wiser individual who'd known me and who had shaped me and mentored me even...

Eryn: Mmm



Elisa: ...you know, “What do you think of this opportunity?” And he was so helpful. He just said, “I think you were made for this,” and he gave me illustrations of where he had seen...I don’t know characteristics in me. I couldn’t see those...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...but he’d been watching, and so it was a really helpful mirror to hold up and go, “Yeah, yeah.” He nudged me forward.

Eryn: Yeah. I think it’s so important to have people like him in your life that help you hold up the mirror for you to see, because sometimes we can’t see clearly. Um when I was in a season when I had to make a bunch of these many crossroads, I recognized like community is so important, to have like a small group of really like close friend that you can let in to the choices that you’re making and just to be able to share and get feedback...

Elisa: Yeah.

Eryn: ...and community mentors. I am so grateful for you to be one of my mentors and...

Elisa: Oh.

Eryn: Oh. Love moment. [Laughing] I’m so grateful to have you in my life to be able to say, “This is where I’m at. This is what I’m going through, so I’m thinking...” To just redirect my paths too. Am I making decisions out of fear or am I making decision out of who I know God is.

Elisa: Mm hmm.

Eryn: Um, the people in our lives do that. Close friends that are centered in their faith and know who God is help us do that.

Elisa: Yeah. There’s all kinds of decisions we come to, Eryn. You know, whether or not we marry a certain person...

Eryn: Right.

Elisa: ...whether or not we don’t marry a certain people.

Eryn: Or even date, or even date a certain person.



Elisa: Or even date.

Eryn: Or say “yes” to a certain business transaction or...

Elisa: Mm hmm.

Eryn: ...even friendships that maybe are unnecessary ending or not. Do you stay in it? Do you...like what is the...I think making boundaries, like even making boundaries with our relationships can be...we can be at crossroads with that. What do I do with this?

Elisa: Yeah.

Eryn: You know, which path do I take?

Elisa: Can you think of a time when you’ve had to do that and...and how did you make that decision?

Eryn: Oh, so many. [Laughing] I’ve got so many. Um, there have been a few times where I even just recently, I’m like, “Lord, I have no idea what choice I’m supposed to make in this.” I’m so grateful that I...I’m not alone to make that choice. And sometimes I feel like my anxiety to the circumstance wants to make the choice instead of being still and allowing...like what you’re talking about yielding. Like allowing Him to just reveal and ah I want to leap into a choice for security and safety, and I think sometimes He’s like, “Let’s just take slow steps towards which path we’re supposed to take.”

Elisa: Can you flesh that out with an example?

Eryn: I can think of so many times when, I mean, for living, for, you know, business decisions of like there was an opportunity for me to have a business partner that I know that we talked about in previous podcasts before, and honestly that...that circumstance in itself just taught me how to pray remove and move. “Lord, remove and move.” I’m so protective of the work that I have done on my heart with Him that I’m just like, “Lord, remove and move anything that’s going to disrupt that.” Sometimes I’m like, I don’t know going back to the carnal/spiritual, I still feel like I’m working that muscle in understanding, right? I don’t know if we ever fully arrive of knowing that that muscles just super strong. We’re always working that muscle, and so...

Elisa: Sure.



Eryn: ...you know, right now I'm in a circumstance where like, "God, I don't know if...if I move forward in this direction that there's going to be grow or if I need to move the opposite direction," and there will still be growth.

Elisa: Okay.

Eryn: I just don't know which way to go.

Elisa: Okay, and so that's where we live most of the time, isn't it?

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: In...in this place where we're at a crossroads and we're asking...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...and...and I think that's real life. We can all look back, "Oh I came to a crossroads and I made this decision and it was right."

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: "Or I made this decision and it was poor."

Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: But the real...the real stuff of crossroads is the present.

Eryn: Yes.

Elisa: You know, how do we navigate, and they're all the time, you know, whether it's a relationship that we're in or a family situation that we're in or a life development, my age and where I'm in.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: That's where we live is...is at these crossroads, and you know what I would love to just zero in there for a few minutes, because I think that's...we can look back and principalize and that's super helpful, but when we're in them...



Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: ...I actually have found a little section of Scripture that I've been camping out in and I...I actually think God offers wisdom that crossroads are really a...a place of living. They're a continual place of being, of dwelling.

Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: This...this passage is from Jeremiah. It's verse 16 of chapter 6. So Jeremiah 6:16. And listen to these...there are a lot of verbs in this verse, and listen to how present it is. Okay, the context is Jeremiah's talking. He's prophesying really to Israel...

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: ...what God doing, and he gives this little nugget, God through Jeremiah, to the people of what to do.

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: And the crossroads in those days were like two paths that kind of diverged. You can go straight on one or you can go kind of scoot of on to another one, and what do you do? And we actually live at crossroads, just as Israel did, so the verse goes, "Stand at the crossroads and look."

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: "Ask for the ancient paths. Ask for the good way and walk in it, and you'll find rest for your souls."

Eryn: Mmm.

Elisa: I hear in these words this we relationship, you know, this is us with God and there's this...this ongoing present. First we stand, which is really just a pause. Notice...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...I'm at a crossroads here.

Eryn: Yeah.



Elisa: Okay, stand. Look, look around. What kinds of circumstances am I facing? Don't...don't go through life just duh, you know, just oblivious to it all.

Eryn: Mm hmm.

Elisa: Ask, God what do you want? Ask for the good way. Ask for the ancient paths. Ask for His wisdom. What does Scripture say? What does the community of the saints say to me? What does my prayer life say to me? What has my journal taught me from other things?

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: Stand, look, ask, and then walk. And that's on ongoing journeying and then what happens as a result? You find rest.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: There's not this freak out, oh my gosh, I'm going to make the wrong decision and God's going to leave me.

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: Or I'm going to make the wrong decision and I'm going to leave God. There is a peaceful...just as Proverbs 16:9 says that there's a peaceful choice in trusting...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...stand, look, ask, walk and you'll find rest. Maybe that's the way God is wooing us at the daily crossroads. We think there's going to be some big red light, green light thing, or the train thing comes down and we can't go any further, but most of the time, it's a process...

Eryn: Yeah.

Elisa: ...of standing and looking and asking and walking and finding Him.

Eryn: Yeah.
